METHODOLOGICAL ORIENTATION TEST - METHODOLOGICAL APPROACHES AND FIRST RESULTS

General introduction

The Vanuatu Scientific Seminar, which was held from 25 to 27 October 2022 at the UNV campus in Port-Vila was initially planned as the first FALAH scientific event. It was postponed due to the closure of open borders in July 2022. Like the Fiji seminar which preceded it, its objective was to seek complementarities and convergences between Work Packages 2, 3 and 4 for the implementation of multidisciplinary through the activities of the FALAH program.

Despite the reversal of the timetable, the Vanuatu seminar followed on from the Fiji seminar, with the theme of "methodological orientation tests and the implementation of multidisciplinary approaches". The lack of fieldwork and exchanges between the teams meant that the initial results were not available.

The preparation of the seminar was done in several stages from July to September 2022.

It was first necessary to prepare the contribution of the MOET and VARTC teams so that they would work together in the organization of the seminar.

Then, the FALAH coordination team organized mini-training seminars for the teams in the design of individual research projects related to FALAH project at the National university of Vanuatu (NUV).

This work was presented during collective meetings and discussed with researchers present in Vanuatu and involved in research on agriculture and food.

Finally, field trips made it possible to identify the actors involved in agriculture and to define the points and stages of the field trip during the October seminar.

The three-day seminar provided an opportunity for presentations in the classroom, divided into sessions, be complemented by a day in the field trip, both in the urban and peri-urban areas of Port-Vila and in rural areas of the island of Efate. The seminar was preceded by two periods of preparation, the first in July and the second in September marked by training sessions for future doctoral students in the form of miniseminars introducing them to research.

First day: Tuesday 25th October 2022

Transversalities between WPs: methodological issues and pathways

Opening of the seminar





For the opening ceremony of the FALAH workshop, participants were invited to the Malvatumauri by the President, Chief Willie Gray PLASUA. He welcomed the attendees by highlighting the importance of traditional knowledge for agriculture and food security. A beautiful performance of sand drawing linking local practices and family farming was displayed.

Professor Jean Marie FOTSING, scientific coordinator, reminded the audience the story of the FALAH project and the importance of collaborative and multi-disciplinary work. The Director for the Francophone University Agency (AUF) Asia Pacific, Professor Laurent SERMET, wished all the participants a successful workshop and reaffirmed the support of the AUF in the Pacific, especially to the National University of Vanuatu (NUV) and to other PIURN Members Universities with the launch of the NERE NAHAL Call for Proposals.

The ceremony continued with the intervention of University of New Caledonia (UNC) President, Professor Catherine RIS, who underlined the preeminent role of UNC in building this important project for the region. IRD (Research Institute for Development) New Caledonia Director, Dr France BAILLY and IAC (New Caledonia Institute of Agronomy) Director, Dr Laurent L'HUILLIER, presented their institution and their work relating to the project.





Following these speeches, the Vice-Chancellor of the National University of Vanuatu (NUV), Mr Jean-Pierre NIRUA, said it was an honor to host the second workshop and received all the partners institutions at NUV.

The Delegate of New Caledonia in Vanuatu, Mr Gaston WADRAWANE reminded the importance of studying family farming, food security in the Pacific Islands impacted by Climate Change and Mrs GWENNAN Delannée, Chargée d'Affaires at the French Embassy in Vanuatu, reaffirmed the support of France to this project funded by the European Union and the strong cooperation between Vanuatu and France. The ceremony was concluded by the General Director of the Vanuatu Ministry for Education and Training, Mr Bergmans IATI, who celebrated the implementation of NUV and its participation in important scientific projects for the region. The session ended with the activity on *Co-designing research priorities for diet, lifestyle and climate with young people,* facilitated by Pr Corinne CAILLAUD, Dr Krestina AMON and Dr Rowena FORSYTH from University of Sydney.





Three scenarios were presented with questions relating to food security, diet, natural hazards for each scenario. Participants worked individually and in groups to compare their answers. This first implementation of the activity allowed University of Sydney to adjust it before presenting it to schools in the different countries of the FALAH Project.

The workshop continued with the session "<u>Ideas and methods for building a collective, shared and relevant definition and issues of Family Farming in the Pacific"</u>.

Dr Séverine BOUARD (IAC), Mr Jonas BROUILLON (IAC) and Mr Guillaume WATELLEZ (UNC) conducted an activity on Family Farming in the Pacific: what does it mean? How to build a collective, shared and relevant definition of Family Farming in the Pacific? The participants were invited to connect to an application and respond to several questions about Family Farming. A discussion followed on the definition of Family Farming for the FALAH project.

3.4 - Towards new methods for integrating Pacific Island community knowledge on nature and family farming into scientific studies - students



The session ended with Dr Gilbert DAVID (IRD), who presented Towards new methods for integrating Pacific Island Community knowledge on nature and family farming into scientific studies.

The discussion following this session of the workshop allowed the participants to share their personal methods to collect and analyzing data on Family Farming. These important outputs will allow to build a collective and inclusive method for the FALAH project in the different fieldworks.

3.5 - PhD Poster Session

The FALAH team attended a session during which the PhD students and expected PhD students presented their research work through a poster made during the training week (17-21 October).
















Session 4: Methodologies for understanding knowledge transmissions in agriculture, food habits and lifestyle

4.1 - The SPAR protocole: "Indigenous Knowledge, Practices and Resilience in the Pacific" (SPARPacific) Pacific Islands University Research Network Grant

The last session of the workshop focused on "Methodologies for understanding knowledge transmissions in agriculture, food habits and lifestyle". Dr Olivier GALY, UNC, introduced the SPAR protocole "Indigenous Knowledge, Practice and Resilience in the Pacific" SPAR-PACIFIC, a project that developed integrated tools and methods to interrogate indigenous practices and knowledge impacted by environmental and socioeconomical context.

4.2 - The use of cultural practices to enhance students' performance in Mathematics: Implementation and assessment of a pedagogical experiment on sand drawing



Mr Pierre METSAN, PhD student from MOET, discussed about his research work focusing on the use of cultural practices to enhance student's performance in mathematics: implementation and assessment of a pedagogical experiment on sand drawing, linking traditional knowledge to contemporary challenges.



4.3 - Challenges, capacities and vulnerabilities to face climate change: The contribution of local knowledge and the exchange of knowledge, know-how and life skills with New Caledonian and Vanuatu residents who grow food products

The session concluded with Ms Lucie GOSSET, PhD candidate at IRD, who presented *Challenges, capacities* and vulnerabilities to face climate change: the contribution of local knowledge and the exchange of knowledge, know-how and life skills with New Caledonian and Vanuatu residents who grow food products. This presentation allowed participants to discuss about traditional knowledge and its implication within the FALAH project.

Third day: Thursday 27th October 2022

Fieldtrip





The Vanuatu FALAH team organized a fieldtrip for all the participants. They first visited the Market in Port Vila (stalls, kitchen, and biogas chamber) before going to Coffee Tree, a restaurant that sources local food products and works with local farmers.



The FALAH team then headed to Epauto Adventist Secondary school to meet the students and the principal, and they visited the school's garden.

The participants went also to Montmartre school to be introduced to the school's community gardens, used to produce food for the students.



The FALAH team had lunch at north Efate, at the agro tourism resort "le Life". Upon returning to Port Vila, the participants visited the correctional garden plot with fresh food produces to supply Vila Central Hospital kitchen.

This rewarding day concluded with a cocktail diner hosted by the MOET at the Chantilly Bay in Port Vila, during which a closing ceremony was conducted by the Vanuatu PhD students with local gifts given to the participants.
